

The purpose of this letter is to summarize changes made to the Town of Weston Dog Park site plan during the design development process. The summary will compare the original site plans provided to this office and the final site plans prepared by this office. Reference is made to the following documents:

Original Design:

 "Site Plan Alternate Road Access to Weston Dog Park" prepared by Town of Weston, dated October 30, 2017 and last revised January 20, 2021.

 "Weston Dog Park – Lord's Highway East, Amended Drainage Evaluation" prepared by WMC Consulting Engineers, dated April 25, 2018.

Current Design:

 "Overall Site Plan, 'Weston Dog Park'" prepared for The Town of Weston, prepared by McChord Engineering Associates Inc., dated May 26, 2021 and last revised January 18, 2022.

 "Stormwater Management Report" prepared for The Town of Weston Dog Park, prepared by McChord Engineering Associates Inc., dated January 18, 2022.

The following is a summary of the changes made:

Driveway/Parking

 The length of the driveway decreased from ±1,285-ft to ±453-ft. An existing wood road will remain as a walking path for pedestrians to access the dog park from the parking area. The amount of parking spaces decreased from 39 to 20.

The alignment of the driveway shifted to follow the existing wood road. This
change significantly decreased the amount of earthwork and tree removal that
was required to construct the new driveway.

o The driveway now ends before an existing stone wall, which will no longer need

to be removed for the driveway construction.

 The driveway is still 20-ft wide, gravel and has an 80-ft diameter cul-de-sac at the end for emergency vehicles to turnaround.

Dog Park Area

o The size decreased from 3.6 acres to 2.8 acres.

 The entrance to the dog park was relocated to where there is an existing break in the stone wall as opposed to creating a new break in the stone wall to access the dog park.

o Approximate locations for benches, signs, waste bag dispensers, etc. were

added to the plan.

Drainage Design

 A new drainage design was performed due to the significant decrease in proposed impervious area as a result of shortening the driveway.

o The footprint of the proposed detention system was essentially cut in half as a

result of the new drainage study, see below:

- Original Design Three (3) rows of 105 linear feet of Cultec Recharger 330XLHD chambers.
- Current Design Three (3) rows of 56 linear feet of 24"x48" precast concrete galleries.

o A high level overflow pipe from the detention system will still be connected to

the existing catch basin on Lord's Highway East.

 The cross-section of the proposed rip-rap swale decreased as the amount of runoff that it is required to be conveyed decreased.

Mitigation Measures

 A Conceptual Planting Plan was prepared by Dr. Tom Failla (Weston Tree Warden) to mitigate any disturbance to the property from the proposed site development. Locations for proposed plantings are reflected on the site plan.

o Location of proposed silt fence was added to ensure that downgradient

properties are protected during construction.

This concludes the summary of changes to the proposed site development.







20. Approval of the unapproved minutes from the Board of Selectmen Regular meeting held January 6, 2022: I move to approve the unapproved minutes from the Board of Selectmen Regular meeting held January 6, 2022, as presented

Board of Selectmen Regular Meeting Minutes January 6, 2022 at 7.30 pm

- 1. Call to order: First Selectwoman Samantha Nestor called the meeting to order at 7.31pm. Also in attendance were Selectman Martin Mohabeer, Selectwoman Amy Jenner, Town Administrator Jonathan Luiz, Aspetuck Health District Director Mark Cooper, Mike Vincelli, Altice Representative Esme Lombard, Land Use Director Tracy Kulikowski, Planning and Zoning Chair Ken Edgar, David Felton, Carolyn Hill, Al Fazi, Bill Fusco, Michael Reiner, Harvey Luft, Mary Francois, Ruth Glazer, Judy Stripp and town residents.
- 2. Pledge of Allegiance: Mr. Luiz led in the recitation of the Pledge of the Allegiance.
- 3. Executive Session with Ira Bloom regarding pending litigation: The Board of Selectmen went into Executive Session at 7.32pm, First Selectwoman Nestor invited Town Attorney Ira Bloom and Town Administrator Jonathan Luiz to join. The executive session ended at 8.42pm.
- 4. Update on Covid from Health District Director Mark Cooper: First Selectwoman Nestor introduced Aspetuck Health District Director, Mark Cooper who provided an update on the current COVID numbers. Mr. Cooper discussed the infectious nature of the recent Omicron variant and explained that infection numbers and hospitalizations are up throughout the region. Mr. Vincelli spoke about the next round of test kits being provided to the community, saying that they will also be distributing to vulnerable populations like seniors and people with disabilities. The rest of the kits will be distributed on Saturday 1/8 at the Middle School at 2pm. There is one kit per car. Mr. Vincelli and Mr. Cooper recommended using the tests when exhibiting symptoms or if exposed.
- 5. Hire of Vicente Miguel Ugalde-Osorio as Building Maintainer effective immediately: Mr. Luiz provided some background information about Mr. Ugalde-Osorio, the position and is current performance. Selectman Mohabeer moved to hire Vicente Miguel Ugalde-Osorio as Building Maintainer effective immediately. Selectwoman Jenner seconded this. The motion carried unanimously.
- 6. **Authorization for Weston to opt out of State Accessory Dwelling Unit provisions**: The Board decided to take no action on this item considering how it was written and instead to add another item to the agenda. First Selectwoman Nestor moved to add the following item to tonight's agenda: "Completion of the Opt-Out Process from State Law provisions regarding Accessory Apartments and Parking Space Requirements." Selectwoman Jenner seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed.

New agenda item: Completion of the Opt-Out Process from State Law provisions regarding Accessory Apartments and Parking Space Requirements. First Selectwoman Nestor introduced Planning and Zoning Chair Ken Edgar to provide background on the subject of Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs). Mr. Edgar explained that if the Weston Board of Selectmen opts out, then the Planning and Zoning Commission can work to create its own regulations that are better tailored to Weston's needs. Selectwoman Jenner asked what how many municipalities are opting out of this provision. Ms. Kulikowski mentioned that a number of surrounding municipalities are opting out including Ridgefield, Redding, Easton etc. Selectman Mohabeer asked what the next steps would be. Mr. Edgar said that the Planning and Zoning would carefully articulate new regulations for the Town of Weston and once the Town has opted out there is no time provision for those regulations to be put in place. Selectwoman Jenner moved that Weston opt out of the accessory apartment provisions contained in

Section 6 of Public Act 21-29 in accordance with the opt-out procedure contained in Section 6(f) of Public Act 21-29. The motion carried unanimously. Mr. Edgar went on to explain the provision for parking spaces and the minimum requirement. He explained that this provision is largely irrelevant for Weston and it would remain unregulated unless we do not opt out. Selectman Mohabeer moved that Weston opt-out of the parking provisions contained in Section 4(d)(9) of Public Act 21-29, in accordance with the opt-out procedure contained in Section 5 of Public Act 21-29. The motion carried unanimously.
